## Bridge closure means detours

### Staff, deputies plan for July 4th traffic conditions

The good news is that work on the new roundabout on Shallowford Road is on schedule but the unfortunate news is July 4th traffic will be dealing with both a closed bridge and roundabout construction.

"We are attempting to get the word out to people that they will be able to exit from U.S. 421 into downtown Lewisville, but when it's time to leave, detours will be necessary," Town Manager Hank Perkins said.

"We have been working with our deputies and believe that we will have enough officers on duty to keep traffic moving," Perkins said.

Corporal Chris Davenport, who heads Lewisville's Community Policing Program, said traffic will be handled as it has in previous years. "Once the event is over, all traffic will be making right hand turns. Wherever you're parked, your exit will be to the right as this keeps traffic moving. There may be an occasion when a situation will require a left turn, but that will be at the officers discretion."

Traffic headed toward the Oaks Shopping Center will be directed to turn right onto Shallowford Road and then be able to use Conrad Road or continue to U.S. 421 and then head north or south.

Those parked at The Oaks Shopping Center will be directed to exit onto Williams Road where they will enter U.S. 421 headed north and if they are headed to Winston, they will take the Shallowford Road exit and circle back to U.S. 421 South.

"We want people to be patient and not expect to have the fireworks end and suddenly everyone is back home," Davenport said. "We will have a large number of deputies working this event and some of those will be out at the U.S. 421 Shallowford Road exit to facilitate those taking the ramp in order to circle back toward Winston."

Davenport said patience is going to be the key to getting everyone out of town safely and in a reasonable amount of time. "We just ask that people to be mindful that it isn't going to happen instantly."

The event begins at 6 p.m. and fireworks are at dark. A rain date of July 5th has been scheduled.

# From your Mayor

The new budget for fiscal 2015-2016 was approved by the Town Council in June and the tax rate remains unchanged. Lewisville has been operating successfully under this tax rate since 2005, a reflection of our conservative approach to fiscal policy.

The new budget continues to provide residents with all existing services and allows us to fund our capital reserves. The capital reserves are basically savings accounts for projects we know will be important to Lewisville in the future -- things like sidewalks and storm-water management, possible building projects. Setting aside funds in these reserves over the years meant that when the time came to build the new town hall or be able to benefit from federal monies, we were in a position to move forward.

I want to thank staff and Council for their work through this most recent budgeting process.

This has been a busy year for Lewisville so far with long awaited construction projects finally getting under way. We have a new bridge nearing completion, a roundabout at a busy intersection and a sidewalk being extended to allow even more residents access to the downtown without getting in their cars.

These construction projects have created traffic issues, delays and detours and we know this has been an inconvenience, so we appreciate everyone's patience. In a way, it's better that all of these are happening at the same time because that means once they are complete, we will see the orange cones and detour signs disappear.

With summer here, we also are in the midst of our busy events season. The weather has not been entirely coop-

erative, but I hope that you have been able to enjoy a concert or a performance of the musical, "Little Women" at Shallowford Square. We introduced a new event this season, the Lewisville Street Party, and while this newsletter is going to press prior to that event, we are all hoping it will be a successful addition to our event's schedule.

Coming up next is our big July 4th celebration and we are once again expecting a huge crowd. As you can see from the article on page one, we have been working to mitigate problems related to the construction projects, but if you're coming downtown that day and parking, remember it will take time to get everyone home safely.

This is also an election year in Lewisville. We elect all town officials every two years and candidates will be filing in July. The election will be in November.

As always, it is my honor and my privilege to serve as your Mayor.

## Next Bulky Item Collection to begin August 31

The next curb side bulky item collection event is scheduled to begin August 31. Please have items at the curb in front of your home by 6 a.m. that morning.

"There was a significant increase in the number of participants during the spring event," Town Manager Hank Perkins noted. "With the new Blackboard Connect system, which allows us to make phone calls, send texts and e-mails about important upcoming events, more people were aware of the event and thus the greater number who took advantage of this opportunity."

The increased participation meant it took Waste Management much longer to complete all routes. "There also was a mechanical issue with the truck, so the long and short of it is we had a lot of frustration on the part of residents and town staff," Perkins said. "We sincerely regret the problems and hope that by taking this opportunity to revisit the guidelines for the event we won't see long delays in service."

Along with everything else, there were a significant number of people who placed items at the curb that were never intended to be included in the event. "This is not an event for people to place bags or boxes of trash at the curb. We don't want to see scrap lumber or bags of old clothes and regular household garbage."

Perkins said if people will review the list of acceptable items and share that information with neighbors who may not read the newsletter, the collection should go much smoother this time around. Staff will also have that same information available on Facebook, Channel 6 and the web site.

"I think Waste Management will be better prepared for the increase in participation next time as well," the manager said. He also noted

that unacceptable items, just as during the last event, will be left at the curb and residents informed it is their responsibility to clean up any items not accepted by Waste Management. "It will save everyone a lot of time and effort if residents will review this list of acceptable materials prior to the event," Perkins said.

Please be aware that Waste Management will pass through each neighborhood only once.

Do not mix bulky items with yard waste, recyclables, solid waste, clothing or shoes. Also remember that computers and related computer equipment are banned from the landfills in North Carolina. CPUs, laptops, monitors, printers, fax or scan devices, mice and keyboards and all televisions must be taken free of charge to 3RC

Enviro-Station, 1401 S. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive.

If you mix unacceptable items with those that are acceptable, nothing will be picked up as it takes too long for the drivers to sort and it delays service.

The bulky item collection event is intended for residential clients, not businesses or apartments.

Please remember that bulky items include carpet, appliances, furniture, mattresses (limit 2) and other approved items on the list. (See article below.)

In addition to including the list here, we also have posted it on our website, ([www.lewisvillenc.net](http://www.lewisvillenc.net)). Please keep it handy so you will know what is acceptable.

### Bulky Item List

Listed below are acceptable/non-acceptable items that we will collect. The collections are scheduled to be performed 3 times per year. You will need to have your items placed at the curb by 6:00 am on Monday of the designated week.

Please watch Channel 6 and the Town of Lewisville Facebook page for updates on scheduled events.

#### Acceptable Items:

**Bulk Waste** -- Chairs, sofas, bicycles, lawn furniture, grills (no propane tanks)

**White Goods** · Stoves (doors must be removed), water heaters, window unit air conditioners, freezers & refrigerators (doors removed)

#### Non-Acceptable Items:

Yard Waste, dead animals, tires, hazardous waste, chemicals, electronic waste, car motors, liquid waste, batteries, motor oil, any equipment containing gas/oil.

Items will need to be placed within 5' of the curb on the Monday on the week of collection. Unacceptable items will be left at the curb.

# Bridge, roundabout construction on schedule

Work on the Williams Road Bridge is on schedule according to NCDOT representatives and Town Manager Hank Perkins.

The bridge replacement began in February and is expected to be completed in mid August. The entire span of the bridge has been replaced and space added on the bridge surface for a sidewalk on one side.

"We know that the closing of the bridge created an inconvenience for those who live on the far side of the bridge from downtown and those traveling to that area," Perkins said. "But once it was determined how seriously the bridge was damaged and the fact that it was already being scheduled for replacement in the future, it made going ahead and doing that work now more efficient."

With Lewisville taking the lead in working with state representatives Senator Joyce Krawiec and Representative Julia Howard, NCDOT was provided grant monies that allowed enhancements to the new bridge, including the sidewalk and street lamps.

"Since this is considered the gateway into downtown Lewisville, Council wanted to try and make the bridge an attractive amenity," the manager said. "We are very grateful to both Howard and Krawiec."

He also expressed appreciation to area residents for their patience during the work. "We had a lot of traffic making use of Lewisville-Clemmons Road while the bridge was closed and it was a little hectic in the beginning in the early morning hours as people headed to work. The official NCDOT detour intended to have motorists exit onto the U.S. 421 toward Yadkinville and then exit at Shallowford Road and back on to 421 toward Winston. People were reluctant to use that detour, but I actually timed it and with the longer wait on Lewisville Clemmons at the bridge, it wasn't much of a time dif-

ference."

As far as the roundabout work, Perkins said it also has gone extremely well. "The change in elevation at that location meant some traffic interruptions and diversions, but people again have been fairly cooperative and we haven't seen too much disruption," he said.

This new roundabout will greatly improve traffic movement at that intersection. Those on Shallowford Road in front of the Oaks Shopping Center often had trouble making a left turn onto Shallowford toward town during morning and afternoon rush hours.



Work on the new roundabout at Shallowford and Williams Roads is progressing well and the work is on schedule to be completed in August.

## Council approves 2015-16 budget

The Town Council approved the budget for fiscal 2015-16 at the June meeting and once again the tax rate remains unchanged.

The approved budget of \$4.1 million includes funding for all current services and the capital reserves.

One cent on the tax rate equals \$117,714.

Property taxes generate the largest revenues for the town, followed by sales taxes. Lewisville saw an increase in sales tax monies last year and that trend is expected to continue in the new year.

Ad Valorem taxes based on the 17.7 cents per \$100 property tax valuation is expected to generate \$2,083,530 in revenue.

Residents in Runnymede and Willowmede are in a municipal service district for lake and dam management and pay an additional tax to cover those expenses. That rate was five cents per \$100 valuation and this year that rate was lowered to 4.5 cents at the request of the Willow Run Municipal Service District Board.

Included in the budget was the funding of the capital reserves. These reserves allow the town the opportunity to set aside funds for specific purposes. Lewisville has had capital reserve funds for sidewalks and bike paths, stormwater management, the Great Wagon Road, greenways and municipal buildings and land.

## Extending sidewalk

Work is under way in June to extend sidewalk from Tullyries to Riverwood Drive.

This project is being financed largely through grant funds.

It will link another neighborhood to the downtown.

Construction may impact traffic on occasion, so please be mindful with driving in that vicinity.

Galloway Reynolds Community Center. The Club led the effort to incorporate the Town then donated the Community Center to the Town. The Club started the first Girl Scout troop, has chartered Boy Scout Troop 752, sponsored the Christmas Parade for 30 years, and provided scholarships to graduating high school seniors for more than 15 years.
