A New Era for the Unified Development Ordiance

The Lewisville Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) is getting a makeover! If you find yourself unexcited, it's probably because you may not know the importance of the UDO. This document contains all of the local laws pertaining to zoning administration, land development, subdivisions, flood hazard prevention and more.

Shortly after Lewisville incorporated in 1991, the town adopted an ordinance that was a slightly modified version of the Winston-Salem/Forsyth County UDO. From time to time, it has been updated and amended, but it has never undergone a comprehensive review. Lewisville has grown and changed significantly over the last 30-plus years. As a result, many components of the UDO simply do not fit the needs and long-term goals of the town any longer.

In 2023, at the direction of Town Council, Staff began working with a consulting firm to streamline, modernize and make the UDO more suited to the unique characteristics Lewisville. A primary goal of the UDO update has been to align it better with the Lewisville Tomorrow Comprehensive Plan, which was adopted in 2022. The final draft of the UDO is currently being prepared.

The Town of Lewisville will host a public engagement session from 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm, May 14, 2025 on the first floor in the Council Chambers at Lewisville Town Hall. This will be a drop-in session. The Town welcomes and encourages questions and comments from local residents. If you would like to learn more about the UDO and how the Town of Lewisville works, we hope you will join us.

Great Wagon Road Expansion Project: What You Need to Know

The North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) has began construction on the Great Wagon Road expansion project as of April 2025.

Great Wagon Road currently stretches from the area near Lowe's Food Shopping Center and the Roller Mill along Shallowford Road to Lewisville-Vienna Road. The project will extend Great Wagon Road to Shallowford Road at the northern driveway to the Oaks at Lewisville Shopping Center.

This expansion will better accommodate our traffic and improve connectivity in our downtown area. It will also be pedestrian-friendly and improve safety for bicyclists and motorists.

Sidewalks, conduitstreet lighting, and additional roundabouts will be installed during the expansion.

This construction will be phased to minimize the impact to travel through the town. Some disrup-

There were eight of us boys who grew up together in the Florida Keys. We were almost inseparable. During the school year, we pretty much made up the football, basketball, and baseball teams at our high school. Not that any of us were particularly good athletes, but there just weren't that many boys in my school to play sports.

On Friday nights everyone on the island would come to the high school to watch football. We didn't have bleachers, just cars pulled up near the sidelines surrounding the field. Most everyone sat in their vehicles to escape the mosquitoes.

Late in the season, when dusk descended before the game ended, everyone would turn on their headlights so we could see the football.

Basketball season held its own ritual, particularly when we played an away game off the island. An armada of cars would meet up with the team bus in the high school parking lot so we could all drive together up U.S. 1, the only road that connected us to the rest of the world. After the game, before we left the mainland, we would all stop at the Burger King in Homestead to celebrate our win or lick our wounds if we lost. A Whopper, fries, and a root beer, 99 cents.

In the summer, when school was out, the eight of us lived at our high school. Not in the classrooms, of course, but on the football field or in the gym. Back then, the coach just gave us a key to get in anytime. There was no better time in life for us.

As you probably gather from this story, our high school was the center of our community. It was where everything happened. It was the one place where everyone came for a ballgame, a spaghetti dinner to raise money for band uniforms, to watch an awkward 3rd grade play or any number of events and activities that brought us together to share the joy of living in the middle of the ocean.

Our high school was where we built community among ourselves.

That's how I feel about Lewisville and the coming of summer. Shallowford Square will be filled with music and events. Kids will swarm our playgrounds. Jack Warren Park and our community center will be the heart of so many activities for our families.


In addition to her contributions to the arts. Campbell has volunteered with the Lewisville Community Assistance Program and held committee positions with the Shiloh Lutheran Church.


Gray said he enjoys working in Lewisville. "It's a good place to work with lots of support and community involvement," he said.
