It was this, or watch them be bulldozed for the new roadway. No one with any sense would attempt it – not trees this big, in late July of a brutal summer, with an excavator and a skid steer and some shov-


I've written a lot about community building and how important it is that we feel part of something bigger, more lasting, more important than just a collection of neighborhoods.

tury into growing these "assets," and good shade is hard to come by. We had the will, a great team, a realistic budget, and a good place to put them. So why not?

On July 21, the Public Works crew. along with our excellent grading contractor "Gradeworks" started the dig. We had a good plan and it was executed with precision. The root balls were dug by the excavator, then hand-trimmed to put clean cuts on the roots and pare them down to a size the skid steer could transport. It was intense work and we moved fast to limit the

time out of the ground in the heat. From there, they were strapped in and transported to the new location where they were seated in beds of blended topsoil/compost and kept constantly wet. We had also pre-treated all of them with an anti-transpirant to keep the leaves from losing too much water and we drenched them with a biostimulant to pump hormones and nutrients into the root zone. Three days later, the seven beauties were comfortable in their new home and will soon cast their shade around the new playground!

Lewisville Safety Who You Gonna Call?

Most of us know to call 911 in a life-or-death emergency. But what about those everyday situations that still need attention, like bumping into a parked car, a neighbor's dog barking all night, or a suspicious vehicle lingering near your home? That's where the non-emergency number comes in handy: 336-727-2112.

Jacqueline Nunez, Administration Assistant to the Communications Manager and Telecommunicator for the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office, explained the difference and why it matters.


"If there are injuries, call 911. If there are no injuries, call the non-emergency number," Nunez said. She added that there are also situations without injuries that still qualify as emergencies, such as being stranded in the left lane of US 421. In that case, call 911. But if you've made it safely off to the shoulder, the non-emergency line is the right choice.

Both numbers connect you to trained telecommunicators, but they're routed differently. Calls to 911 and the non-emergency line ring with distinct tones, allowing staff to respond more efficiently based on the urgency of the situation.

Using the right number ensures you get the help you need while keeping emergency lines open for life-threatening calls.

So go ahead and take a moment to save **336-727-2112** in your phone, or jot it down to keep it on the fridge. You never know when you might need it.



Speaking of Leaves

It's that time, when the frustrated cries for help come from the folks who don't understand why we don't have leaf and limb pickup in Lewisville. If you've lived here forever, you consider it just a fact of life, but if you've moved in from a place where you had those services, it may be a post-Halloween horror. Í hear you. There are two main reasons why Lewisville does not provide this service. One, as you might imagine, is the expense. Startup costs for a leaf and limb program, including equipment and employees, would easily add 20% or more to the tax rate. Secondly, leaf collection especially is in direct conflict with our stormwater program. We work hard and are actually under a federal mandate to keep our conveyances clear and our local surface waters clean. All the leaves and debris piled in the street can end up filling storm drains, blocking ditches, and clogging culverts. Beyond the traffic headache we see in many other cities, with the streets full of leaf piles, there are significant water quality and flooding concerns.

On the bright side, we're seeing more and more private contractors step into the void and offer this service on demand. If you can't find a spot on your property and you've composted all you can, I encourage you to reach out to one of these companies. Our town's trees are significant assets, and a season of leaves is a small price to pay!

To help improve traffic flow during busy school drop-off and pick-up times, drivers on Lucy Lane can now only make right turns onto Shallowford Road from 7:15-8 a.m. and 2:15-3 p.m.


