Spring Bulky Item Pickup Begins April 13

The next Bulky Item Pickup will begin on **Monday, April 13**. Lewisville residents wishing to participate in the pickup should have all acceptable items curbside by 6 a.m. on that day. Waste Management will only make one pass through Town for this pickup.

This event is intended for the disposal of items too large to fit within a trash can. All items must be in plain view, within three feet of the curb, and cannot be bagged or boxed. If Waste Management identifies a contaminated collection pile, the site will not be serviced.

From Your Mayor What is Civic Engagement?

It's a pleasure to connect with you again. As I mentioned in my last letter, these Lewisville Citizen installments will be my way to cover topics that I think you all will find interesting. I'm excited to use this platform to share pieces of myself with you as we grow together.

Today, I will compare the power of Civic Discourse and Civic Engagement. Both are important for the betterment of our society, but both approaches can create confusion.

Civil Discourse is a foundational activity that fosters a flow of thoughts, opinions, and information among citizens. When done respectfully, Civic Discourse can bridge gaps that may have appeared too wide before. While 93% of communication is non-verbal, there are a variety of platforms to utilize for Civic Discourse if speaking face-to-face is not an option.

The conflict that arises with Civic Discourse is that many have become products of our own environment. Our environment consists of our inner circles, our sides of town, our political and religious beliefs, and our corner of the internet, where we live in an algorithm that reinforces our preconceived notions. This has led to a decrease in the level of high-quality face-to-face Civic Discourse.

Many people genuinely want to have tough, but respectful Civic Discourse to find common ground. However, many times, it leads to a feeling of banging your head against a brick wall when their level of sincerity is not reciprocated. Others use social media to share their wishes for change in society, but feel their voices are falling on deaf ears.

Civic Discourse is vital, but there are societal issues that are currently limiting its effectiveness in the modern world.

Civic Engagement is the process of taking Civic Discourse to the next level. The ideas, opinions, and wishes of a citizen lead to action steps that galvanize other citizens to join. These steps can include collaborating with your fellow citizens, government agencies, non-profit organizations, private companies, etc in efforts to make a difference for your desired cause.

The downside of Civic Engagement is that it honestly requires more effort than Civic Discourse. Civic Engagement involves more face-to-face, high-quality conversations with a clear intent. It involves time, planning, consistency, and follow-up to make sure you achieve your goal.

I made the decision to choose Civic Engagement in part because I became exhausted with arguing with trolls on the internet. There are so many problems facing our world, and it can be frustrating to feel that you have no power to change things. Whether you ever agree or disagree with my beliefs, I challenge you to find your power through true Civic Engagement the way I learned to do.

Thank you for your time. Thank you all for making Lewisville a great place to live.

Don't Miss Out on the Grant Funding Assistance

In October 2025, the Town Council adopted Resolution 2025-044, which approved an **annual application process** for grant funding requests.

Organizations must apply annually in the month of April to the Town of Lewisville for operating funding assistance, specific program costs, or capital items necessary for the successful execution of their mission.

Application Process

Applications will be available on the Town website (link) or at Town Hall and must be submitted to the Town Clerk during the application process between April 1 and April 30. Only fully completed applica-

tions will be considered for grant funding.

Eligibility Criteria

Organizations serving the residents of the Town of Lewisville are defined as those with a 501(c)(3) designation; is a group that regularly come together for purposes of promoting, providing, or supporting service to the Town of Lewisville or its residents, and are described in one or more of the following:

- Uses a location within Lewisville's corporate limits for its primary service place
- Has an office in Lewisville
- Has a majority of its activities in

the Town of Lewisville

- Conducts a majority of its activities in Lewisville
- Is a regional organization that focuses on a significant program in Lewisville, but otherwise conducts business and operations outside of Lewisville

Funding and exemptions for any organization shall be considered only as allowed by the North Carolina General Statutes. For funding, organizations must meet the criteria for public purpose expenditures by tax-paid dollars.

Note: The application process to become a exempt organization will open in August of 2026.

April 13 Bulky Item Pickup List

Acceptable Items

Household furniture, lawn furniture, carpet, extra large rugs, carpet, bicycles, toilets, grills (no propane), mattresses, box springs (limit of 2 box springs per household), stoves, refrigerators, freezers (doors must be removed), water heaters, and dishwashers.

Prohibited Items

Televisions, computers, mirrors or any glass, household waste, yard waste, dead animals, tires, hazardous waste, chemicals, paint, microwaves, electronic waste, car motors, clothing, shoes, books, general recycle items, liquid waste, batteries, motor oil and any equipment containing oil or gas, lumber scraps, construction debris, bagged trash, cardboard, and cardboard boxes.

New! Roundabout Update

The Town of Lewisville has begun construction on a new roundabout at the intersection of Robinhood Road and Lewisville-Vienna Road. This intersection is currently controlled by a traffic signal, and the new roundabout is designed to improve safety while also helping traffic move more smoothly through the area.

Construction will take place primarily at night to reduce daytime disruptions. While crews work, please use extra caution when traveling through the area. At least one lane of traffic is expected to remain open for most of the project, but occasional full closures may be necessary. Residents are encouraged to plan alternate routes when possible. The Town will post any disruptive closures to social media and the Town website.

The project is being completed by BW Infrastructure, LLC., the contractor awarded the project by the Town.

From the Firehouse Safety Bulletin

As warmer weather arrives in Lewisville, and our community spends more time outdoors, the Lewisville Fire Department (LFD) wants to share a few important safety reminders to help keep you and your family safe this spring.

Check Local Regulations

Spring often brings increased brush burning. Always verify current Forsyth County burn status and restrictions.

When Burning is Permitted

- Keep the fire small and manageable
- Clear a 25-foot area around the site
- Always have a water source or extinguisher nearby
- Never leave a fire unattended
- Fully extinguish the fire before leaving

Remember: Most outdoor burning requires complying with NC open burn rules. When in doubt, contact the LFD.

Grill Safety

- Keep grills at least **10 feet away** from structures and deck railings
- Inspect propane tanks, hoses, and connections for possible leaks
- Never use grills indoors, in garages, or on enclosed porches
- Dispose of charcoal ashes only after they are completely cool

Seniors from any public or private school in Forsyth County are eligible to apply.



The Special Gift of a Great Walk

Not far from the Square on Shallowford Road, between the former Textures Salon and Hayworth Miller, you'll notice something is happening. Trees have been cared for, a walkway curiously leads away from the sidewalk, and new lights will soon illuminate the space. Thanks to a generous gift of land by the late Fred Moser in 2016, the Town is creating a linear park as a pedestrian connector between Shallowford and the new Great Wagon Road. Mr. Moser graciously dedicated his longtime family plot with the simple request that it be used for a public benefit. As a daily walker who could be seen strolling our streets regularly, it could not have worked out better that his legacy will be a peaceful, green stretch that pedestrians will enjoy for generations and make a great walk through Lewisville even better.

This new gem doesn't have an official name yet, but look for it to open officially when the GWR sidewalks are open and safe to use. Additional features and amenities will be added over time in cooperation with our Parks and Recreation, Environmental Conservation and Sustainability, Beautification, and Public Art committees.
